INAUGURAL CITIZEN ACADEMY A SUMMER SCHOOL SUCCESS!

The HCWA hosted a unique type of summer school in June, as the Authority's first Citizen Academy provided 13 individuals a crash course in the water industry and an up-close look at their water utility.

The 2022 HCWA Citizen Academy participants took part in three classes covering topics that included an introduction to the HCWA water and wastewater systems, as well as insights about the HCWA administration, budget, field operations, capital projects, and more. Each weekly class was followed by a VIP tour of a facility on the weekend – the Tussahaw Water Plant, Walnut Creek Water Reclamation Facility, and the Cubihatcha Outdoor Education Center and adjacent Long Branch Reservoir. In addition, the Citizen Academy participants learned valuable lessons in water conservation, proper disposal of fats, oils, and grease (FOG), watershed protection, environmental stewardship, and additional topics in water/wastewater public education.

CAREERS AVAILABLE IN THE WATER PROFESSION

The HCWA needs water and wastewater plant operators to fill job openings created by an increasing number of retirees leaving the profession. Thus, we have partnered with Southern Crescent Technical College to create the Water Quality Technician Certification Program to recruit and train the next generation of water professionals.

The four required courses of the Program are being taught at SCTC under the direction of retired HCWA Top Operator Sheila Kern. The courses rotate each semester, with the 2023 class schedule as follows:

- Spring '23 Semester 16 weeks from Mid-January to Mid-May, with the Water Treatment and OSHA courses being offered.
- Summer '23 Semester 10 weeks, beginning next August, with the Wastewater Treatment and Water Supply courses being offered.

After completing these required courses, you must pass the state exam and get some on-the-job training, and then you're all set to begin a well-paid career as a water professional!

WATER QUALITY REPORT SHOWS HOWA TAP WATER IS CLEAN, SAFE

Want to know what's in your drinking water and why?

The HCWA's 2022 Water Quality Report, which is also referred to as a Consumer Confidence Report (CCR), has been published and is available for review on our website. The Report's results reveal that the HCWA is in complete compliance with all regulatory requirements for drinking water safety. The Authority had no violations of the industry's drinking water quality standards this past year.



The lab data in the 2022 Henry County Water Quality Report include measures of regulated substances found at the source, during drinking water production at both of the Authority's water treatment plants, and within the HCWA distribution system. Those laboratory results presented in this year's Report are from tests conducted from Jan. 1 – Dec. 31, 2021.

HELPING YOU AVOID "IRRITATION FROM IRRIGATION"

New Homeowners should check your irrigation settings

While irrigation systems can help with the efficiency of your outdoor watering, if they are not set properly, they can run up your water bill.

Some new Henry County homeowners have been getting higher than expected HCWA water bills during their first few months at their residence, due to not being aware that their home builder may not have turned off the irrigation system after the sale.

New homeowners are encouraged to learn about the proper use of their irrigation system and its settings. If you have irrigation, please check to see if the system is on or off and review the controller programming (watering schedule) to verify run times.

Tiered rate structure encourages conservation

Our water and sewer volumetric rates have a tiered structure to offer customers a financial incentive to conserve water.

The first tier of our volumetric rate

has a minimum charge for consumption less than 6,000 gallons/month, with an increase when consumption is between 6,000 and 10,000 gallons, and a maximum charge for consumption that exceeds 10,000 gallons.

Water Efficiency Kits Available at HQ

In addition to properly managing your irrigation system and keeping consumption within the lower tiers of our rate structure, you can conserve water and save money on your monthly HCWA bill by picking up a free water efficiency kit (while supplies last) at our Customer Service office within the Authority Headquarters located at 1695 Highway 20 West in McDonough.
