CHECK FOR WATER LEAKS TO SAVE WATER AND MONEY

With the recent recognition of national Fix A Leak Week in March, the HCWA reminds you to check for household leaks, especially if you have an irrigation system.

Here are some steps that can help:

- Locate your water meter in the Meter Box located near the curb of your home.
- 2
- Write down the number or reading on your meter. Set a timer (15 minutes is good) and make sure there is no water running in the house. 3.
- 4. After that time has passed, recheck the reading on your meter. If that number has changed, you have a household leak.

With the arrival of spring and summer, check to make sure leaks are not in your irrigation system, which can be damaged from pipes that may have been frozen during the winter. To determine if a leak is in your sprinkler system, investigate a little further:

- Turn off the valve to your sprinkler system and note the meter reading again. 5.
- 6. Set another timer and recheck the meter after that time has passed.
- If the meter stops moving, or the reading is the same, the leak is in your irrigation system.
- Turn the valve to your sprinkler system back on and set one zone to water. 8.
- 9 Walk around that zone to see if you see any wet spots or pools of water, or perhaps water bubbling up
- from the ground. Check to see if the sprinkler 10. heads are working properly, or if heads are broken.
- Repeat this process (steps 8-10) for each zone of your irrigation system.
- Contact a Certified Irrigation 12. Contractor to fix any leaks vou locate.

HCWA AND SCTC PROVIDING INTERNSHIPS FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

The HCWA and Southern Crescent Technical College (SCTC) have expanded their partnership to offer a Summer Institute Internship Program for local high school students.

Rising High School Juniors and Seniors can participate in the paid internship program in the fields of Industrial Systems Technology and Horticulture. The HCWA-SCTC Internship Program begins this Summer, as select SCTC courses run concurrently with the internships. The number of internships is limited, with competitive pay offered at \$14 per hour.

The inaugural internships, which complement the respective courses at SCTC, are being offered from May 24 to July 18, 2023. In addition, students will be assigned an HCWA employee mentor during their internship as well. Course financial aid is available through SCTC to participating students, who must be at least 16 years old to participate.

PLEASE HELP US IN THE FIGHT AGAINST FOG -NO FATS, OILS OR GREASE DOWN THE DRAIN!

Did you know that approximately half of sewer spills and overflows are caused by fats, oils, and grease (FOG)?

When fats, oils, and grease are poured down the drain, they can clog your home's plumbing and damage our sewer system, where grease can harden and clog sewer lines. The last thing you want is to have sewer back up into your home!

Please help protect our infrastructure, the environment, and your home's plumbing by not pouring fats, oils, or grease down your drain. Instead, let cooking grease cool, pour it into a sealed container, and throw it in the trash. Please also wipe plates and dishes clean before washing in the sink or dishwasher

We also ask our customers to be careful about what you flush down the toilet. Just because something goes down the toilet, doesn't mean it will break down in the sewer system. Please do not flush non-dispersible items such as facial tissues, rags, cleaning cloths, cotton swabs, dental floss, feminine hygiene products, cat litter, or wet wipes – even those that say 'flushable." Remember, the toilet is not a trash can.
